REPORT FROM THE CHAIR

I wanted to make sure we were here because Commissioners have other obligations for the rest of the week, but we're here today, and we made it. We had a good Ways and Means meeting, a good Committee of the Whole. I think we're OK to get this budget passed today. I want to thank Commissioner Kinloch as Chair of the Ways and Means Committee, all the members of the Ways and Means Committee, and thank the staff for all of your hard work, our Fiscal Analysts led by Terrance Adams. Thanks to Management and Budget. Always, this takes a collaborative effort, all of the Administration and the Commission working together, especially with our staff, to bring us to where we are today. So again, thank you for all of your hard work and due diligence. Hopefully, we are an example for the federal level and state level on how to pass a budget before the end of the Fiscal Year."
