CONDOM TIPS

- To help prevent STDs and unwanted pregnancies, condoms should always be used during oral, vaginal, and anal sex.
- Condoms should be thrown away after a single use.
- Check the expiration date on condoms.
- If you think you have an STD, stop having sex and get tested. Tell your partner if you test positive, and make sure your partner gets tested!
- Always use latex condoms. If you or your partner are allergic to latex, use polyurethane (plastic) condoms. Never use lambskin condoms—they do not prevent the spread of HIV.
- Use a water-based lubricant.
 Condoms can break when used with baby oil or Vaseline.
- Make condoms a fun part of sex. They come in different sizes, colors, and flavors.
- Give condoms to friends as gifts.

MEN

- Encourage all your sex partners to use condoms.
- Never carry condoms in your wallet. Store them in a cool place.
- In order to be effective, condoms must be used properly.

WOMEN

- Encourage all your sex partners to use condoms.
- If your partner won't use a regular condom, try using the female condom. It goes inside the vagina.
- Birth control pills and other contraceptive drugs provide no protection against sexually transmitted diseases.
- When used correctly, condoms are highly effective at preventing unwanted pregnancies.
- If your partner doesn't want to use a condom, say no to sex.
- Some spermicides may cause vaginal irritation or vaginal and urinary tract infections.
- When used correctly, male condoms are 97% effective in preventing pregnancy.
 Female condoms are 95% effective.
