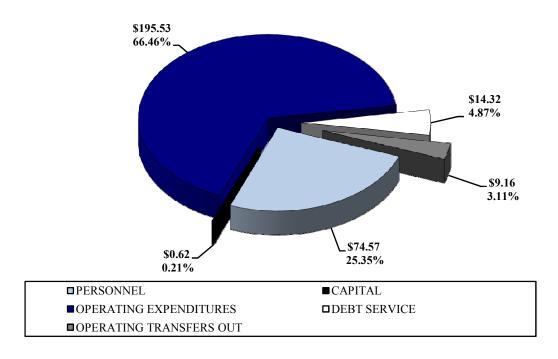

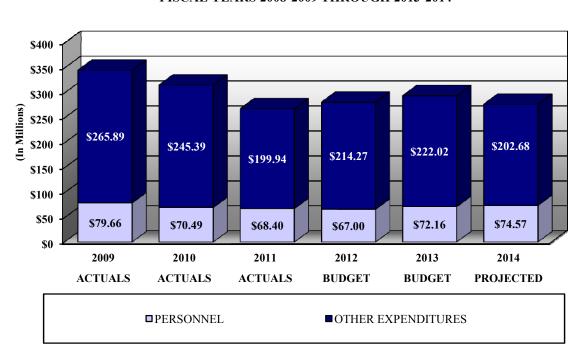

EXPENDITURE TREND ANALYSIS FISCAL YEARS 2008-2009 THROUGH 2013-2014



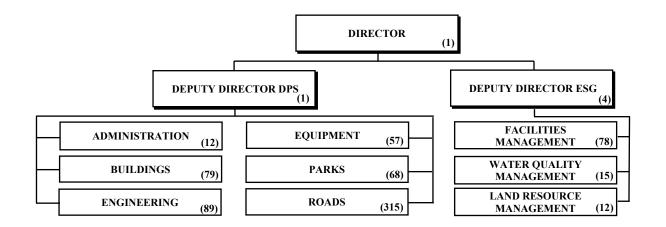

MAJOR ACTIVITIES AND DESCRIPTIONS-

DIVISION OF ADMINISTRATION: The Division of Administration is responsible for providing central control and coordination of the operations of the other five divisions of the Public Services Group. The Administration Division provides follow-up to assure timely completion of internal processing of grants, contracts and personnel needs. The Administration Division is also responsible for personal computing support, department fiscal control and scheduled review of Department administrative and operating procedures as well as overseeing the Department's compliance with the Managing for Results initiative.

DIVISION OF BUILDINGS: The Division of Buildings is responsible for efficiently maintaining, operating, controlling and managing all Wayne County General Fund buildings. The goal is to maintain the facilities so that they remain secure, occupied, attractive, and environmentally safe and that all systems operate in a proper and acceptable manner. Buildings Division also provides proper housing for Wayne County agencies and a number of State agencies in both County owned buildings and leased facilities. The objectives are accomplished through the use of Tradesman, Housekeepers and Support staff.

DIVISION OF ENGINEERING: The Division of Engineering is responsible for providing engineering and technical services as necessary to support the programs and activities of the two operating divisions (Parks and Roads) and three support divisions (Administration, Buildings, and Equipment).

DIVISION OF EQUIPMENT: The Division of Equipment provides support services for the daily activities (mowing, asphalt paving, street sweeping, snow and ice control, etc.) of the various Department of Public Services divisions. This division also maintains safe and reliable automotive and heavy equipment inventory for the General Fund units. A complete machine shop is also maintained and operated for the benefit of all County Departments and divisions as requested. The Inventory/ Personal Property Management (IPPM) Unit orders and stocks approximately 4,600 items such as vehicle repair parts, aggregate, paint, general hardware and fuel for all county departments.

DIVISION OF FACILITIES MANAGEMENT:

<u>DRAIN OPERATIONS</u>: This unit of the Facilities Management Division, located at the Henry Ruff Field Office in Westland, is responsible for the maintenance and operation of over 500 established drainage districts extending over 1,500 miles, and all ancillary facilities to the drains. The full time field employees perform three main types of work; Drain inspection, reactive

maintenance and preventative maintenance. Drain inspection work is primarily performed during the leaf-off season from fall until spring. The information from these annual inspections provides us with the ability to plan and schedule for upcoming maintenance projects. Reactive maintenance is work that comes in on a daily basis and is performed as service requests from citizens, municipalities or other government entities. Preventative maintenance is general maintenance work that can be performed year-round on most county drains to preserve the drains functional integrity.

WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITIES: The plant staff operates the Downriver Wastewater Treatment Facility (WWTF). The WWTF, which is capable of treating 225 million gallons per day (MGD), serves 13 communities with an approximate population of 284,000 residents. This facility is located on a 34-acre site in the City of Wyandotte. Recent expansion and upgrades make the Downriver Wastewater Treatment Facility and the Downriver Collection System a state of the art and worldclass operation. WWTF's mission is to provide the Downriver communities with efficient, cost effective and environmentally sound wastewater treatment. The Facility continues to make improvements through changes proposed by the CAMPP project. As the result of one of the Comprehensive Assessment and Master Planning Project (CAMPP) recommendations, CSO/Pump Station and Sewer/Meter staff was relocated to the WWTF in 2006.

WASTEWATER CONVEYANCE SYSTEMS: This operation also maintains and operates wastewater conveyance systems that transport waste to the Detroit Water and Sewerage Department (DWSD) facilities. The systems, called the Northeast System and the North Huron Valley/Rouge Valley (NHV/RV) System, serve 18 Wayne County communities and transports flow from Oakland and Macomb Counties to DWSD. Also, this operation is responsible for maintaining the interceptors, all associated pump and lift stations, and an extensive flow monitoring system.

INDUSTRIAL PRETREATMENT PROGRAM: The Industrial Pretreatment Program performs a vital environmental function by assuring that national, state and local pollution discharge limits are met by customers discharging sanitary sewer flow to the Downriver Sanitary Sewage Disposal System. Its duties include issuing permits, inspections, sampling and lab work, monitoring, and enforcement. Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) has recognized Wayne County's program as one of the most comprehensive programs in the State of Michigan.

DIVISION OF LAND RESOURCE MANAGEMENT: SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT PLANNING: All counties in the state are required to prepare and implement a solid waste management plan. The Wayne County Solid Waste Management Plan is a comprehensive strategy that reduces dependency on landfills, promotes recycling, composting and ensures that facilities sited within the County will serve the long-term disposal needs of Wayne County residents and businesses.

The Solid Waste Management Planning Section is responsible for all planning activities, enforcement of plan provision, data gathering including solid waste generation, disposal and recycling rates. Staff provides technical assistance and educational outreach regarding recycling and household hazardous waste to citizens and businesses in the County. The staff also coordinates the CLEAN illegal dumping clean up program and the household hazardous waste collection program.

SOLID WASTE TECHNICAL SERVICES: Staff of this operation inspects each solid waste landfill, transfer station, waste-to-energy plant and processing plant in the County. Inspections are completed either weekly, monthly, or quarterly depending on the type of facility, to ensure they are complying with State and County regulations to protect health and the natural resources of the County. Also, staff of this operation work closely with the MDEQ to review proposed disposal sites, construction plans and geological data. Staff provides recommendations to MDEQ for construction permitting or licensing of facilities based on these reviews. In addition, the section investigates illegal dumping and unlicensed disposal sites. Enforcement measures can be taken either by the Division or jointly with MDEQ. Division authority for enforcement of solid waste regulation is Part 115 of Michigan's Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, P.A. 451, and the Wayne County Solid Waste Ordinance, No. 2004-787.

SOIL EROSION AND SEDIMENTATION CONTROL:

The Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Program reviews plans of construction projects, issues permits, and conducts routine inspections to regulate impact of soil erosion and sediment pollution on water quality. Uncontrolled land development of previously undisturbed areas may cause large amounts of soil and sediment to enter streams and wetlands. As the County Enforcing Agency (CEA), this program enforces the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, P.A..451, Part 91 and the Wayne County Soil Erosion and Sedimentation Control Ordinance No. 2001-759 in 33 communities. The program, through the use of the Municipal Civil Infractions Ordinance and with

cooperation from the local communities and the MDEQ, handles compliance and enforcement.

DIVISION OF PARKS: The Division of Parks is responsible for protecting, maintaining and programming park areas, open spaces, and recreation and leisure facilities for the purpose of enhancing the quality of life for families and citizens served by the County of Wayne.

DIVISION OF ROADS: The Division of Roads is responsible for maintenance of the road system of approximately 1,440 County primary and local roadways and 462 miles of State trunk lines and freeways. It is the mission of the Division of Roads to protect and extend the useful life of all of the roads under the Division's jurisdiction and to keep those roads reasonably safe for public travel.

DIVISION OF WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT:

WATERSHED MANAGEMENT UNIT (WMU):

The WMU works to protect and restore Wayne County's water resources through the advancement of a holistic watershed management approach. The unit works with Wayne County communities, businesses, citizens, state and federal regulators, and other stakeholders in Wayne County watersheds to implement the requirements of the federal Clean Water Act for discharges (including storm water, combined sewer overflows, and sanitary sewer overflows) to the County's waterways. The unit also coordinates the activities of all Wayne County departments to ensure compliance with the County's Certificate of Coverage under the Michigan NPDES General Storm Water Discharge Permit. In addition, the WMU partners with communities, businesses, citizen groups and others to facilitate and implement activities such as detection and correction of illicit sewer connections, stream bank stabilization and habitat protection/restoration projects necessary to restore and protect the County's water resources. The WMU facilitates and coordinates the County's Rouge River National Wet Weather Demonstration Project (Rouge Project), a national demonstration of a watershed approach to pollution control and natural resource management. A key activity is the management of federal Rouge Project grants awarded to Wayne County, and management of numerous Rouge Project subgrants to nearly 50 local communities and agencies to implement elements of the Rouge Project.

ENGINEERING SERVICES UNIT (ESU): ESU focuses on the capital improvement needs of the Facilities Management Division (FMD) and its customer communities. Staff provides a variety of specialized services to assist with operations, maintenance and capital projects' implementation necessary to meet the requirements of the Federal Clean Water Act for

discharges from the County's Downriver Wastewater Treatment Facility (DWTF) and wastewater transport systems. Major activities currently include implementation of the Final Order of Abatement from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) to mitigate sanitary sewer overflows in the Rouge Valley wastewater transport system; design and construction of numerous upgrades to the Downriver WWTF; design and construction of improvements to the Northeast/Milk River

wastewater transport/treatment systems as mandated by MDEQ administrative consent orders; design and construction of needed improvements to the Southgate-Wyandotte Drainage District's facilities; design of a flood mitigation program for the North Branch of Ecorse Creek; and implementation of studies to determine impacts of discharges from the County's combined sewer overflow retention treatment basins on receiving water quality.

FISCAL YEAR 2011-2012 ACCOMPLISHMENTS AND HIGHLIGHTS -

The Roads Division used 19,475 tons of Asphalt to refill approximately 115,930 potholes and resurface 8.5 miles of county local roads. During the winter, the division used 39,997 of salt.

DPS launched Wayne County Compass (compass.waynecounty.com) a web site that provides traffic, road and weather conditions and allows the public to track Wayne County's truck fleet in real time. The system also provides live and recorded video from the view point of our truck drivers so the public can see their Wayne County Road Crews in action.

Completed and implemented a state of the art command center which integrates dispatch with the County's on-line and phone hotline complaint system. Foreman receive work orders in the field sent directly to their on-board computers and the command center allows managers to track real-time locations of the truck fleet and view live video feeds from selected work trucks. Smart reports generated from the system allows for quality review and efficient utilization of resources.

Clean and Green - To make Wayne County roadways cleaner and greener, Wayne County Roads hired 30 seasonal employees to work from April, 2012 to October, 2012 which will allow the Roads Division to do more sweeping and mowing cycles. Additionally, Roads will increase the utilization of Alternative Work Force crews to accomplish more road side litter pick up.

The Equipment Division was recognized with a 2011 National Association of Counties (NACo) Achievement Award for the Equipment Re-Purposing Program. One flusher tanker that was used for the sweeping operation and one obsolete tanker for Forestry were both modified to perform snow and ice control duties.

The Engineering Division managed and inspected 12 road improvement and reconstruction projects that had a combined total construction cost of \$24.4 million dollars.

The Wayne County Parks Division had a very productive FY 2011-2012 and is moving toward greater efficiencies and capital expansions in FY 2012-2013. The Capital Improvement Program slated for FY 2012-2013 will bring conclusion to several major projects, and continue the aggressive upgrades of park improvements. The Design

Section accomplished several projects in the past fiscal year in service of the citizens of the County of Wayne. These projects include but are not limited to:

- The completion of phase II restoration paving of the Hines Park Bike Path which is over 17 miles in length.
- Completed restoration of Sumac Pointe and Perrin Comfort Stations.
- The continuation of upgrading all the public barbeque grills throughout the park system.
- In partnership with DOE, the continued expansion of the ongoing Grow Zone projects.
- The Michigan DNR Land Trust Grant has been awarded for continued improvements for the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge Gateway Site.
- The Parks Division continues to aggressively seek grant opportunities to improve it facilities such as the Nankin Museum, comfort stations and other park facilities.
- The Parks Division continues to work with municipalities in Wayne County by providing funding for capital improvement projects.
- The completion of new playscapes and ball diamond upgrades throughout the park system.
- The completion of electrical upgrades throughout Hines Park.
- The installation of a new picnic area at Elizabeth Park

Parks Design Section will continue to apply the vision and goals of the administration in FY 2012-2013, which is to provide new and enhanced facilities for its patrons. The Division will undertake the following to name a few:

- Continue with phase II of ball diamond renovations.
- New safety surfacing for our play structures.
- Capital Improvements to the Chandler Water Park Wave Pool.
- Phase III of the paving of recreation areas in Hines Park.
- The conclusion of the Elizabeth Park Bridges replacement.
- Continued development of the Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge. The Division is

building partnerships with a number of corporations, civic groups, foundations, non profits and the education community in its design and development. Present partners include Metropolitan Affairs Coalition, Downriver Community Conference, National Fish and Wildlife Service to name just a few

 The Parks Division will also be implementing a more aggressive grant application campaign to supplement the funds allocated.

The Downriver Wastewater Treatment Facility met all its permit limits for the calendar year 2011. This was the 5th consecutive year that the Downriver Facility met 100 % of its National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System permit limits and will receive the Platinum Peak Performance Award from the National Association of Clean Water Agencies (NACWA). The prestigious platinum peak award recognizes member facilities for outstanding 100% compliance of their permit limits for five consecutive years.

Drain Operations has seen a reduction in response time to service requests and continues to exceed customer expectations with almost a 98% customer satisfaction rating. Drain Operations staff has successfully administered drain petition and maintenance resolution projects. Improvements in process have resulted in more efficient operations and enhanced citizen communication.

Land Resource Management Division successfully completed its seventh year of the Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) collection program in 2011. The division held four events in FY11, which were hosted by Dearborn, Redford Township, Taylor and Van Buren Township. These collection days were held on Saturdays in March, June, August and October with over 5,400 Wayne County residents from 41 communities participating. A total of 660,820 lbs. of household hazardous waste was collected at these events.

Solid Waste Planning staff provided educational presentations to a variety of community and school groups to teach them the benefits of recycling and environmental protection. A major revision of Wayne County's Resource Recovery Guide was completed this year with more than 7,000 copies being distributed to Wayne County residents. This critical educational tool advises residents on how to properly dispose and recycle everything from bicycles to yard clippings.

The Land Resource Management Division C.L.E.A.N. program conducted 22 clean up projects in 2011 including 19 illegal dump site clean ups and 10 community scrap

tire collection events. A total of 1,301 cubic yards of waste and 4,192 scrap tires were cleaned up as a result of these projects.

The Water Quality Management Division maintained Wayne County's compliance with our countywide Storm Water Discharge Permit from MDEQ for 13 consecutive years. Since 1992, the Watershed Management Unit has managed the County's Rouge River National Wet Weather Demonstration Project such that it was declared "A Blueprint for Success" by the U.S. EPA Office of Inspector General.

Last year, more than 211 facilities were inspected for illicit connections to storm sewers or to the County's waterways, which resulted in the prevention of more than 2,360,000 gallons of polluted water from entering the surface waters of Wayne County.

Pollution prevention activities continue to be blended into existing services to provide cost-effective benefits. For example, "no mow" or "grow zones" are being established on Parks properties and along County Road right of ways to reduce the amount and intensity of mowing operations while infiltrating storm water into the ground, thereby reducing storm water runoff and associated sediment and nutrient pollution loadings to the Detroit River and Lake Erie. Significant cost savings have been realized from reducing the amount of land that is regularly mowed. During 2011, installation of 15 additional acres of grow zones within Wayne County Parks was initiated, designs were completed for seven additional grow zone sites within County road right of ways, and 175 trees were planted along County roads. An additional 4,150 tree seedlings and 150 trees were planted at Michigan Green Schools in partnership with local communities and schools.

There were 141 schools recognized in 2011 as Wayne County Green Schools for implementing a minimum of 10 Specific energy-saving and environmentally friendly activities. This program has grown from 12 schools in the first year (2008). Wayne County's program is the second largest Green Schools Program in Michigan.

Design and construction of \$82 million in improvements to Wayne County wastewater transport and disposal systems is underway as of April 2012. Low interest loans were obtained from the Clean Water Revolving Fund to finance approximately 87% of the costs of these projects. An additional \$10.3 Million in funding was obtained under the 2009 American Recovery and Reinvestment Act for two of these projects.

NEW INITIATIVES FOR FISCAL YEAR 2012-2013 -

The Equipment Division will focus on improvements to the preventative maintenance program to improve reliability and to extend the useful life of the fleet. Recently, the Equipment Repair Unit has implemented annual safety inspections for light trucks and automotive equipment. This procedure allows management the ability to schedule upcoming maintenance and reduce costly repairs.

In addition, the I.P.P.M. Unit will continue efforts to reduce inventory costs through "just-in-time" delivery, "order on request only" and maintaining minimum levels of supplies while meeting customer demands.

Equipment will continue its fleet modernization efforts with the planned purchase of 10 new ten yard dump trucks and 7 new five yard dump trucks.

The Water Quality Management Division (WQMD) will continue to work with other County divisions, local communities and others to implement innovative

measures to cost-effectively manage storm water from the County's roads and properties that is discharged into rivers, lakes and streams. These measures will include implementing more no mow "grow zones" along County roads, drains and parks.

WQMD will aggressively seek alternative sources of funding, such as grants under the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, to offset the costs associated with implementing the County's required storm water management activities.

The Land Resource Management Division will be expanding its outreach efforts to Wayne County residents in 2013 to address the proper disposal of electronic and pharmaceutical waste. The Division plans to establish a permanent collection site for electronic waste for residents in 2013. The Division will also partner with the Department of Health and Human Services to provide additional resources to residents for the proper disposal of pharmaceutical waste and medical sharps.

IMPACT ON OPERATIONS

Prudent management of budgeted funds and a mild winter resulted in significant cost savings that have allowed the Department of Public Services to maintain the previous year's level of staffing. Also, it has allowed the Department to increase the level of modernization in equipment, resulting in increased efficiency in operations. The Department has also created a low salt initiative in the Roads Division, which has significantly reduced salt expenditures. This approach has permitted the Department of Public Services to be able to maintain responsive and effective snow and ice removal services, despite continual decreases in Act 51 funds.

Savings to the Environmental Services Group budget have been realized through realigned staff and consolidated field operation locations to reduce the General Fund support to drain operations. Also, the staff have worked with the communities to implement strategies that will provide cost effective wastewater treatment and transport including: prefunding of future construction projects while reducing overall financial commitment, reducing sludge transportation expense with the completion of Downriver Solids Treatment Project, and reducing infiltration to the County operated interceptor which reduces the overall treatment expense. Staff will continue to seek cost effective methods of providing core services.
