





Michigan Teacher Named 2025 National Special Education Teacher of the Year

Arlington, Va., February 27, 2025 – Michael Craig, leader of the Drew Horticulture program in Detroit, Michigan, has been named the 2025 Teacher of the Year by the Council for Exceptional Children (CEC). The award recognizes excellence among teachers who provide direct services to children and youth with exceptionalities and who exemplify the best in supporting students with disabilities and/or gifts and talents.

Craig teaches at the Drew Transition Center, part of the Detroit Public Schools Community District, a vocational center serving students with moderate to severe disabilities, including those who are visually impaired, hearing impaired, physically impaired, or on the autism spectrum. As the founder of the Drew Horticulture Program, Craig has merged evidence-based educational practices with hands-on, real-world learning experiences that benefit both students and the local community.

Through the program, students cultivate, harvest, and sell fresh produce at local markets—an initiative that has not only led to employment opportunities for students but also provided fresh food to school families, community members, and local food banks. The program empowers students with disabilities by equipping them with valuable skills that foster independence, employment readiness, and healthier lifestyles.
