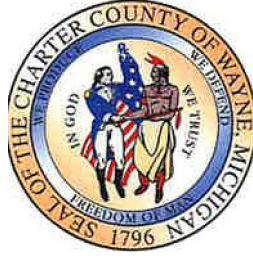

Terrance Adams spoke about the funding of the programs and wanted to know if general funds funding could be replaced with indigent funds that the department has. Kamau Kheperu said that he would review data to see if the department could expand the usage of indigent funds.

Dr. Avani Sheth spoke about the empowerment plan and making sure individuals are able to recognize and respond to an overdose using Narcan.

Charli Rose provided an overview. 4,078 decedents were reported to the office, which took jurisdiction of 655 cases. Of those, 404 received full autopsies, 220 received inspections only and 31 received limited autopsies. Of the 655, 305 cases were submitted for histology. Turnaround time was 2.5 days. 400 cases had final causes of death within 14 days and another 192 was 29.2 days. Cremation permits are doing well. Within a 92-day time period, 2,952 cases were approved within a day.

The Department of Health, Human & Veterans Services (HHVS), Central Administration, respectfully submits this status report on various **Well Wayne initiatives** in accordance with HHVS Budget Instructions and **Enrolled Ordinance 2025-659** in the system as 2026-20-004. This report provides updates on Commission-approved programs implemented as community health initiatives serving Wayne County residents.

This report includes updates on the following initiatives:

- **Well Wayne Air Quality Network (JustAir)**
Contract No.: 2023-20-002 | Reference Enrolled Ordinance 2025-659 Page 18, Item 11
In partnership with JustAir, this initiative—known as the Wayne County Air Quality Network—aims to enhance environmental health monitoring and public engagement through the deployment of real-time air quality sensors in targeted communities.
- **Well Wayne Medical Debt Relief (RIP Medical Debt)**
Contract No.: 2024-20-004 | Reference Enrolled Ordinance 2025-659 Page 18, Item 12
In partnership with Undue (formerly the RIP Medical Debt Initiative), this project focuses on reducing the burden of medical debt for low-income Wayne County residents by purchasing and forgiving eligible debts.
- **Well Wayne Stations (Naloxone (Narcan) Vending Machines)**

Well Wayne Air Quality Network Overview

PROJECT STATUS UPDATE: As of January 2026, there are 101 Fixed Air Quality Monitors across Wayne County with our partner JustAir. We are continuing to explore opportunities to educate residents.

RECENT MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- Identified potential new air quality programming through a sustainability plan
- Reviewing renewal options for the JustAir contract

UPCOMING MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- County cross-departmental Air Quality Workgroup session with HHVS, EDD, and DPS through to discuss next steps for Wayne County Air Quality Program
- School based air quality mobile monitor distribution

PROJECT SUMMARY

Wayne County's 100 fixed air quality monitor network provides continuous, neighborhood-level data on pollutants across Wayne County. These monitors deliver real-time insights into local air conditions, identify disparities in exposure, and supply reliable data to inform public health initiatives, environmental policy, and community engagement efforts. This project is more urgent than ever, as the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America's 2025 report ranks Detroit as the most challenging U.S. city for asthma sufferers—rising from third place in 2024 back to number one—driven by increasing hospitalizations linked to pollen, infections, and poor indoor air quality.

IMPACT SUMMARY

Wayne County's fixed air quality monitor network continues to provide high-quality, neighborhood-level data that informs health decisions, policy discussions, and community advocacy. Average AQI across the 100-monitor network remains in the "Good" range, but disparities persist, with disadvantaged neighborhoods experiencing worse air quality, often near industrial facilities, highways, and construction sites. Additionally, 3 monitors are being added to the network to address gaps in coverage and target high priority areas.

To date, 260 residents subscribed to real-time air quality alerts, empowering them to take protective action based on local conditions. The network generated 18 formal data requests from nonprofits, governments, researchers, and residents—supporting grant applications, public health advocacy, business operations, and community organizing. Additionally, the data has been used to challenge industrial permitting proposals that would add more pollution to already overburdened communities.

Well Wayne Medical Debt Relief

PROJECT STATUS UPDATE: As of January 2026, approximately \$56.5 million in medical debt has been abolished for more than 82,000 Wayne County residents. A new wave of debt abolishment letters was issued in December, and the County continues to receive positive resident testimonials. We are continuing outreach to expand participating healthcare providers and pursuing a no-cost contract extension to support ongoing implementation and maximize program impact.

RECENT MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- Eliminated an additional \$14.75 million in medical debt for more than 20,000 residents
- Sent a large wave of debt abolishment letters to residents in mid-December

UPCOMING MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- Commission no-cost contract extension request

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Medical Debt Relief Program reduces the financial burden of health care by purchasing and retiring qualifying medical debt at a fraction of its cost. This initiative provides immediate economic relief to thousands of Wayne County residents, improves access to care, and advances health equity by addressing one of the leading social determinants of health.

IMPACT SUMMARY

Since launching in March 2024, the Wayne County Medical Debt Relief Program has eliminated approximately \$42 million in medical debt for more than 71,000 residents. By removing this burden, the program has provided families with immediate financial relief and greater freedom to seek the care they need without fear of unmanageable costs.

Wayne County's effort is part of a larger national initiative that has relieved \$30 billion in medical debt for 20 million people. Locally, the program continues to spark conversations on health equity and affordability, while advancing opportunities to expand its reach.

Well Wayne Stations (Naloxone Vending Machines)

PROJECT STATUS UPDATE: As of January 2026, countywide coverage has been achieved through placement of 88 stations. Through these stations, the following resources have been distributed:

- 25,474 naloxone (Narcan) kits (50,948 individual doses).
- 9,078 fentanyl test strip kits (45,390 individual test strips).
- 5,893 xylazine test strip kits (29,465 individual test strips).

RECENT MAJOR ACTIVITIES

- Following the success of 2025, the WWS initiative is now transitioning to Phase 2 of implementation.

UPCOMING MAJOR ACTIVITIES

Phase 2 of the WWS initiative involves a multi-prong approach to increase access in disproportionately impacted communities, with a focus on data collection and analysis, multi-sector collaboration, and community engagement and education. Upcoming educational and engagement opportunities are planned throughout the year, with an aim for collaborative delivery by Wayne County Health, Human, and Veterans Services, the Center for Behavioral Health and Justice (CBHJ)/Wayne State University, and other local and community partners.

PROJECT SUMMARY

The Well Wayne Stations initiative is a partnership between the Wayne County Department of Health, Human, and Veterans Services (WCHHVS) and the Center for Behavioral Health and Justice (CBHJ) at Wayne State University's School of Social Work. The WWS initiative is an evidence-based overdose prevention and harm reduction strategy to reduce overdose deaths and save lives in Wayne County. The initiative expands free, low-barrier access to lifesaving health supplies, including naloxone (Narcan) and drug checking tools (fentanyl test strips; xylazine test strips), through countywide placement of public vending machines and newsstand-style devices.

IMPACT SUMMARY

- Placed over 80% of the WWS machines in communities most impacted by overdose.
- Strengthened multi-sector partnerships across Wayne County through collaboration.
- Enhanced data usage, with input from people with lived and living experiences (PWLE).

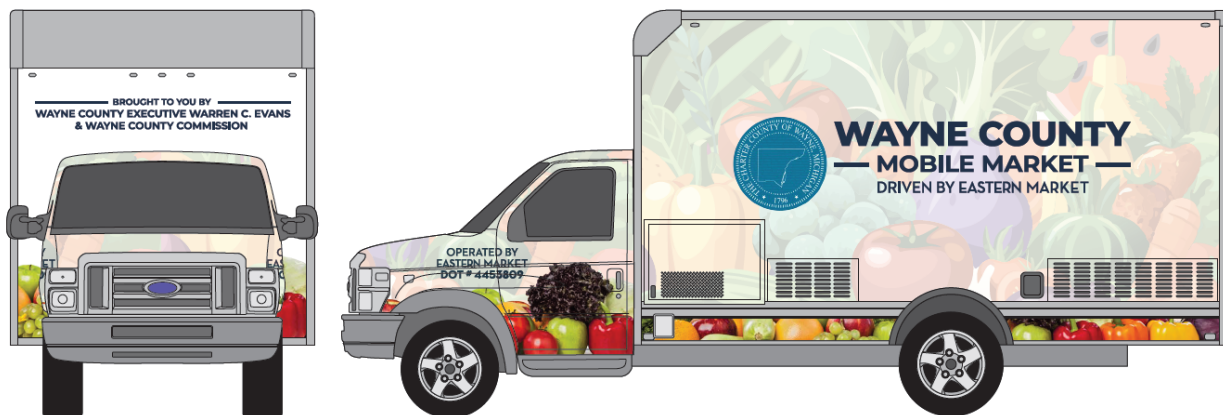

The Fresh Trucks program, in partnership with Eastern Market, expands access to fresh, affordable produce across Wayne County through retrofitted buses serving as mobile grocery stores. The program also offers healthy recipes and nutrition education, and accepts SNAP, EBT, and WIC benefits.

IMPACT SUMMARY

The Fresh Trucks program will be deployed at strategic locations throughout Wayne County identified using zip code–level data with the highest rates of food insecurity, where residents report insufficient food access throughout the month due to financial constraints. Priority deployment sites include senior housing and senior centers, WIC clinics, and Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHCs), increasing convenient access to fresh, nutritious food for residents most in need.

The program is implemented in partnership with Empowerment Plan, a Detroit-based nonprofit that produces the coats and supports workforce development for individuals transitioning out of homelessness.

IMPACT SUMMARY

Coats for Hope successfully distributed 1,000 multifunctional sleeping bag coats to residents experiencing homelessness across Wayne County, with distribution prioritized in high-need areas. The program engaged 12 community partners, including shelters, public safety agencies, warming centers, and community organizations, and expanded reach through additional distribution by Wayne County Commissioners, HHVS divisions, and employees. This coordinated, countywide effort helped provide immediate winter protection while strengthening partnerships to inform future homelessness response and winter relief strategies.

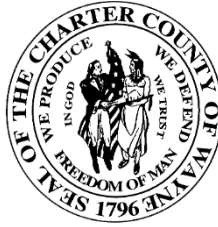

CONTENT

The Department of Health, Human and Veterans Services is requesting Commission approval of Modification No. 1 to a grant agreement with the W.K. Kellogg Foundation (of Battle Creek), extending the term, to allow for the completion of the Learning Parents Partnership project.

AMOUNT

The amount remains \$250,000, with no County match required.

TERM

The term is extended through December 31, 2026.

The term of the original contract was from July 1, 2024 through December 31, 2025.

The overall term will be from July 1, 2024 through December 31, 2026.

SCOPE

Learning Parents Partnership

- This program aims to aid student parents enrolled in higher education. Student parents have the highest rate of dropping out before completing a degree in higher education. According to the Institute for Women's Policy Research, 52% of student parents are left without a degree after six years of enrollment. Furthermore, 78% of single student parents are considered low-income. This is often observed among single mothers who have had children in their teens. Their families are often found within lower-income households where they suffer from poor health outcomes. Single parents have a hard time scaling up their skills to work in higher-paying jobs to provide for their families. With the Learning Parents Partnership, the program will support 100 student parents who are 26 years old and younger with income earnings that fall under 200% below the poverty line with a \$500 monthly stipend throughout the duration of the 2024-2025 academic year. These

unconditional cash payments - without burdensome administrative requirements or other spending restrictions - acknowledge that families know how best to meet their own needs. In addition to the stipends, the program will work with three local community colleges to administer a comprehensive assessment, training and coaching. These interventions will build capacity in the participating learning institutions to provide high-touch support services for parenting students to reach their academic and career goals.

- Three Participating Community Colleges

- Henry Ford Community College
 - Wayne County Community College
 - Schoolcraft Community College.
- This program represents a scalable solution that can help the County reimagine and improve its social safety net. At the end of the cohort experience, the County hopes to see that 100% of participating learning institutions report applying an equity-driven student parent lens to policy development and evaluation. Furthermore, the County hopes that 100% of its participants report that their engagement with this program enhanced relationships with their learning institution and deepened their professional relationships with other student parents across the learning institution after one year of participation. Finally, by the end of year two, the County anticipates learning institutions identifying and engaging with at least 30 new student parents across various departments. With this program, low-income student parents have a higher chance of completing their degree programs and graduating. These student parents can achieve economic mobility, leading to better job placement and therefore breaking the cycle of poverty. Furthermore, this program will provide student parents with resources that will increase their health outcomes and the health outcomes of their children.

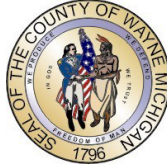

THE REAPPOINTMENT OF KEVIN MCNAMARA TO THE DETROIT WAYNE INTEGRATED HEALTH NETWORK BOARD (2026-01-002)

CONTENT

The County Executive's Office is requesting Commission approval of the reappointment of Kevin McNamara (of Van Buren Township) to the Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) Board, pursuant to the State of Michigan's Mental Health Code (Public Act 258 of 1974; MCL 330.1212(2)(a) and MCL 330.1222(1)) and Resolution No. 2013-392, which created DWIHN (formerly known as the Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority). See Attachment A for Mr. McNamara's biography.

COMPENSATION

Per MCL 330.1224:

- "A board member shall be paid a per diem no larger than the highest per diem for members of other county advisory boards set by the county board of commissioners and be reimbursed for necessary travel expenses for each meeting attended. The mileage expense fixed by the county board of commissioners shall not exceed the mileage reimbursement as determined by the state officers compensation commission. A board member shall not receive more than 1 per diem payment per day regardless of the number of meetings scheduled by the board for that day."

TERM

The term is from April 1, 2026 through date March 31, 2029.

WHY THIS IS BEFORE THE COMMISSION

Per the State Statute:

- The reappointments are before the Commission pursuant to MCL 330.1212(2)(a):
 - "Six board members appointed by a majority vote of the county board of commissioners from a list of nominees submitted by the county executive of that county."

Per the County Charter:

- The reappointments are before the Commission pursuant to County Charter, Article IV Sec. 4.385(2), Appointments:
 - “If the Commission fails to act on an appointment within 30 days after its submission to the Commission, the appointment is effective.”
 - The Commission received the paperwork on February 17, putting the 30-day mark at March 19.

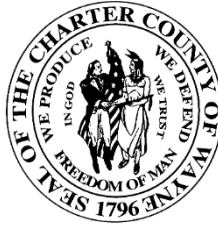

THE REAPPOINTMENT OF KARIMA BENTOUNSI TO THE DETROIT WAYNE INTEGRATED HEALTH NETWORK BOARD **(2026-01-001)**

CONTENT

The County Executive's Office is requesting Commission approval of the reappointment of Karima Bentounsi (of Northville Township) to the Detroit Wayne Integrated Health Network (DWIHN) Board, pursuant to the State of Michigan's Mental Health Code (Public Act 258 of 1974; MCL 330.1212(2)(a) and MCL 330.1222(1)) and Resolution No. 2013-392, which created DWIHN (formerly known as the Detroit Wayne Mental Health Authority). COMPENSATION
